
The Era of Directed Energy Weapons (DEWs)

Recently significant investments have been made by India in fields of DEWs.

▶ DEWs are ranged weapons that use concentrated energy from electromagnetic or particle technology, rather than kinetic energy, to degrade or destroy targets



- Applications of Directed Energy Weapons
 - Military Defense: To intercept and destroy incoming missiles, neutralize drones, and disable enemy electronics.
 - Law Enforcement and Border Security: Non-lethal DEWs e.g. microwaves or lasers can be used for crowd control and border security.
 - Space Operations: To protect satellites from debris and anti-satellite weapons.
- Advantages
 - Complementary to conventional weapons: DEWs use energy fired at speed of light, making them faster and potentially less costly.
 - Reduced Logistical Demand: DEWs reduces the need for physical ammunition.
 - Other advantages: Precision, stealth & more destructive etc.
- Challenges
 - Less effective for farther distances.
 - Wider beam DEWs (High power microwave or millimeter wave weapons) affect all assets, whether friend or foe.
 - Uncertainty around long-term health effects of DEWs on people.
- Steps taken by India
 - Directionally Unrestricted Ray-Gun Array (DURGA)-II Project: Initiated by DRDO to build 100-kilowatt lightweight DEW.
 - 2kW Directed Energy Weapon (DEW) System: Developed by Bharat electronic limited for countering new threats like drones
 - Laser Science and Technology Centre (LASTEC): Laboratory of DRDO developing direct energy weapons.

NITI Aayog publishes a report titled "Strategy for the development of Seaweed Value Chain"

Seaweeds are numerous types of marine plants and macro algae that thrive in rivers, lakes, and other bodies of water.

- Cultivation of seaweeds are part of aquacultures. Fishing and aquaculture sector contributes 1.5% of India's GDP.
 Significance of Seaweed Farming
- **Economic:** Valuable for bioactive compounds and applications in food, pharmaceuticals etc.
- **Environmental:** Important role in Carbon Sequestration & climate resilience.
- ▶ Nutrition imperative: Provide vital minerals and Vitamins like A, B1, B12, etc.

Challenges faced by Seaweed Farming

- Lack of a comprehensive policy framework,
- Lack of availability of quality Seeds
- Ecological concerns (Exotic species impact on biodiversity and coral reefs).

Recommendations For Promoting Seaweed Farming

- ➤ Regulatory and governance reforms: Forming National Steering Committee; Priority Sector Lending (PSL) for seaweed, etc.
- ➤ Social Security and Financial Support: Providing crop insurances; mobilization of farmers through SHGs etc.
- ▶ Infrastructure and institutions: Establishment of seed banks, processing centers, marketing centers etc.

Steps taken by India

- ▶ PM Matsya Sampada Yojana: Target of 1 million ton seaweed production per year by 2025.
- Constitution of an expert committee chaired by Dr. V K Saraswat (NITI Aayog) to review the draft policy on development of seaweed value chain in India.
- ▶ Offshore cultivation in Andaman region started by National Institute of Ocean Technology- Atal Centre for Ocean Science and Technology for Islands (NIOT-ACOSTI).
- **Development of a GIS-based portal:** To view the mapped seaweed cultivation sites.







FDI From China Could Boost India's Exports: Economic Survey

Economic Survey (2023-24) suggested that Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) from China could be leveraged to benefit from 'China plus one Strategy'.

China Plus One Strategy

- It refers to practice of international businesses active in China coupling their investments with a second facility, generally in another Asian economy.
- It was driven by disruption due to China's zero-COVID policy, growing tensions between the US and China, rising labour costs in China, etc.
- Beneficiaries
 - Mexico, Vietnam, Taiwan and Korea were direct beneficiaries of US's trade diversion from China.
 - India could capitalize on this strategy by either integrating into China's supply chain or encouraging Chinese FDI, with the latter being more advantageous as:
 - Due to the growing trade deficit with China, it is more effective to have Chinese companies investing in India for export than India importing Chinese goods to re-export with little
 - Many current beneficiaries have also increased FDI inflow from China.

Concerns Associated with Chinese FDI in India

- Border Dispute: Ongoing military tensions and China's tendency to exert regional supremacy.
- **Security Risks:** Chinese FDI could open the door to espionage, supported by its laws like the National Intelligence Law, which mandates cooperation with national intelligence efforts.
- China's support for Pakistan

India-China Economic Relations

- Bilateral Trade: China is India's top import partner. Bilateral trade amounted to US\$ 118.4 billion in FY24.
- Trade Deficit: India is facing a trade deficit of around US\$ 85 billion.
- China's FDI in India: It was around 0.37% of the total FDI inflow between April 2000 and March 2024.
- India's initiatives to narrow trade deficit: PLI Scheme, anti-dumping duties, quality control orders, etc.

Cabinet approved 8 National High-Speed Road Corridor Projects

Projects spanning a total length of 936 km at and incurring a total capital cost of Rs. 50,655 were approved (refer the table).

These projects will be implemented using various PPP (Public Private Partnership) modes, including BOT, HAM and EPC.

Highways Development in India

- Corridor-Based Approach: It has led to the identification of 50,000 km of High-Speed Highway Corridors based on GSTN and
- Trends (2014-2024): Length of National Highways (NH) has increased 1.6 times from 0.91 lakh km to 1.46 lakh km.
 - → Total capital investment in NH has risen from Rs. 50,000 crores to Rs. 3.1 lakh crore.

Benefits of Corridor-Based Highways

- Logistics Efficiency: For instance, the Agra-Gwalior corridor will reduce the distance between Agra and Gwalior by 7% and cut travel time by 50%.
 - This will boost freight movement and ease of doing business in India.
- Boost to Tourism: For example, the Tharad-Ahmedabad corridor will provide connectivity to key tourist destinations in Rajasthan (e.g., Mehrangarh Fort, Dilwara Temple) and Gujarat (Rani ka Vav, Ambaji Temple).
- Other Economic Benefits: Each rupee spent on infrastructure boosts GDP by 2.5-3 times. The 8 projects will create around 4.42 crore mandays of direct and indirect.

RBI revises Non-Performing Assets (NPAs) provision norms for Cooperative banks

Need for New Norms arises as some banks were not recognizing required provisions for Non-Performing Assets (NPAs) as an expense.

- ➤ These new norms (applicable to Urban, state and central co-operative banks) will bring uniformity in treatment of Bad & Doubtful Debt Reserve (BDDR).
 - Several co-operative banks established BDDR for financial stability (For managing bad loans).

New Norms:

- ➤ All provisions (related to "BDDR" or other head) under Income Recognition, Asset Classification, and Provisioning (IRACP) norms must be charged as an expense to Profit and Loss Account.
- ➤ After accounting for all provisions as per IRACP norms and other regulations, co-operative banks may make appropriations of net profits to BDDR.

Co-operative Banks:

- Works on principle of cooperation and are owned and operated by their members.
- Can be divided into Rural and Urban co-operative banks.

Issues with co-operative Banks:

- ➤ Regional Disparity: Almost 82 per cent of total UCBs and around 90 per cent branches of all UCBs are concentrated in Western and Southern regions of country (2020).
- Dual Regulation: Managerial, administrative activities are overseen by state governments while banking activities are regulated and supervised by RBI / NABARD.
- Other issues: Inadequate avenues for raising capital, High Gross NPAs etc.

Steps Taken for Reform in co-operative banks:

- Banking Regulation (Amendment) Act, 2020: Brought management, governance, winding up, etc. under RBI's purview.
- ▶ Umbrella Organization for Urban Cooperative Banks: National Federation of Urban Co-operative Banks and Credit Societies Ltd.

52 out of 53 top Indian apps use dark patterns to deceive users: ASCI report

Report by Advertising Standards Council of India (ASCI), titled "Conscious Patterns," reveals that **almost all Indian apps use deceptive or dark patterns** in their business.

Dark Patterns

- ▶ Definition: Business practices employing elements of digital choice architecture, that impair consumer autonomy, decision-making or choice.
- Impact: Users often suffer financial losses, data breaches, and compromised privacy.
- ▶ Initiative: ASCI and Department of Consumer Affairs issued guidelines for the prevention and regulation of Deceptive Patterns in 2023.

Key Dark Patterns Identified by ASCI Study

- ▶ Privacy Deception: Manipulating users into unknowingly sharing more personal data than intended (e.g., permission for location tracking)
- ➤ Interface Interference: Hiding certain parts of the platform to misdirect users into taking actions (e.g., unlock cashback).
- ➤ Drip Pricing: Revealing additional fees gradually and making the final price higher than that originally quoted (e.g., packaging charges).
- ➤ False Urgency: Creating a sense of artificial pressure (e.g., only a few seats available).
- ➤ Confirm-Shaming: Using guilt or social pressure to manipulate users into confirming an action (e.g., choice between upgrade now vs. I don't want a smarter software).

Conscious Pattern Website

- Based on the study a "Conscious Pattern Website' has been created.
- It enables makers to build Digitally Conscious Products.
- Its vision is to enable informed consumer choices online.

Axiom Mission 4 (Ax-4)

India selected **Shubhanshu Shukla and Prasanth Balakrishnan Nair** (Group Captains in the IAF) for Axiom-4 mission.

They will **train in U.S.** and experience gained during the mission will be **beneficial for human space programme.**

Axiom Mission 4 (Ax-4)

- It is the fourth private astronaut mission of NASA and a private US company Axiom Space.
- It is expected to dock with the International Space Station (ISS) for fourteen days.
- Axiom Space has contracted SpaceX as a launch provider.



Global Alliance for Improved Nutrition (GAIN)

GAIN, launched a report titled 'The Case for Investment in Nutritious Foods Value Chains: An Opportunity for Gender Impact'.

Report calls for nutrition investments in the agri-food sector which can reduce gender inequalities, increase productivity and enhance business resilience.

About GAIN

- Swiss-based Non-governmental Organization launched at the United Nations in 2002 to tackle the human suffering caused by malnutrition.
- Supports public-private partnerships to increase access to the missing nutrients in diets.









Surrogate Advertisement

Ministry of Health asked Sports Authority of India and BCCI to prevent surrogate advertisement of tobacco/alcohol by sportspersons.

Surrogate advertising

- It involves advertising a product that cannot be advertised openly due to legal restriction.
- Advertisers create ads that help in building a brand, and without naming the actual product that is being indirectly advertised. For example, a Tobacco company selling stationary products.
- These advertising came into India after the Cable Television Networks (Regulation) Act, 1995 and its rule banned direct liquor, tobacco and cigarette advertisement.
- They are banned under the Guidelines for Prevention of Misleading Advertisements and Endorsements for Misleading Advertisements, 2022.



World Trade Statistics 2023

The WTO issued "World Trade Statistics 2023".

Highlights of World Trade Statistics 2023 on Agriculture Export

- The top 5 exporters were EU> US> Brazil> China> Canada.
- Collectively, the top ten exporters represented a 71.9% share of world exports in 2023.
- India was the 8th largest exporter.
 - India's exports worth \$51 billion constituted 2.24% of agriculture exports in 2023.



Sovereign Green Bond (SGrB)

Second sovereign green bond auction of current financial year (FY25) received low response as traders refused to pay greenium.

Greenium refers to **pricing benefits** based on logic that **investors** are willing to pay extra/accept lower yields for sustainable impact.

About SGrB:

- Green bonds are used to finance or refinance eligible green **projects,** resulting in environmental benefits.
- Union Budget 2022-23 announced SGrB for mobilising resources for green infrastructure.
- Framework for the SGrBs was issued by the government in 2022.



Schistura Sonarengaensis

Recently a new species of loach fish has been found in Sonarenga, Nakama, and Chiabol caves of Meghalaya's South Garo Hills district.

- These are small elongated freshwater fishes of family Cobitidae and are native to central and southern Asia.
- Usually nocturnal fishes that inhabit both still and flowing waters.
- Use their barbels(Sensory Organs) to comb the bottom for worms, larvae, and other food.

About Schistura Sonarengaensis

- Morphological Features: Prominent eyes & dull white or palebeige body.
- Distinction: They are not blind like other cave species found in Jaintia and Khasi Hills.



FASTag

New FASTag rules to link it with Vehicle registration and mobile number came into effect from August 1, 2024.

About FASTag:

- Device that employs Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) technology for making toll payments directly while the vehicle is in motion.
 - Technology uses radio waves to identify objects by reading information contained in wireless tag from a distance.
- Flagship programme of Ministry of Road Transport and Highways & NHAI.

Benefits:

- Operationalizes National Electronic Toll Collection (NETC) program with nationwide interoperability.
- Reduces congestion and cash handling at toll plazas.



Maritime Partnership Exercise (MPX)

Recently Indian Naval Ship Tabar participated in maritime Partnership Exercise (MPX) between India and Russia.

About Pingali Venkayya (1876 - 1963)

- Born in Krishna district of Andhra Pradesh.
- Freedom fighter who believed in Gandhian Principles.

Key Contribution:

- Designed Indian National Flag on request of Mahatma Gandhi.
- Served as a soldier in the British Army in South Africa during the Anglo Boer war in Africa.
- Participated in different movements including Swadeshi Andolan under the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi.
- Literary works: 'Bharatha Deshaniki Oka Jatiya Patakam' (National flag of India).
- Earned several titles, including Patthi (Cotton) Venkayya & Jhanda (flag) Venkayya.
