

A research titled, 'Global food security threatened by potassium neglect' was published


- Potassium (K), alongside nitrogen (N) and phosphorus (P), is a vital nutrient for plant growth.
 - ⊕ In India, NPK ratio of 4:2:1 is considered ideal for macro-level monitoring of consumption of plant nutrients.
 - Potassium in soil can exist in four pools based on its availability for uptake by plant roots, namely, Soil solution K, Exchangeable K, Nonexchangeable K and Mineral K.
 - Largest pool of these is the **mineral pool (e.g.** feldspars and micas), but it is unavailable for plant use.
- Key Findings of the research
 - Output An estimated 20% of global agricultural soils face severe potassium deficiency.
 - Negative soil potassium balances: More potassium is removed by crops than applied as inputs in the soil.
 - E.g. In India, despite the perception of ٠



- potassium-rich soils, negative soil potassium balances are causing crop yield losses.
- Limited geological reserves: E.g. Canada, Belarus and Russia possess approximately 70% of the world's potash reserves. Ourrent shortages of potash fertilizers are driven by increased fertilizer demand, post-COVID-19 recovery, Russia-Ukraine
- conflict etc. Substantial environmental impacts: For each tonne of potassium extracted, around three tonnes of mine waste is generated which is washed by rains into surrounding rivers and groundwaters.

A study titled "Triple dip La-Nina, unorthodox circulation and unusual spin in air quality of India" was conducted.

- The study was conducted by National Institute of Advanced Studies and Indian Institute of Tropical Meteorology.
- Key-highlights
 - Indian region encountered a mysterious trend reversal in pollution (PM2.5) during the winter of 2022-23.
 - The unusually worst air quality over South-Western India, whereas relatively cleaner air over the highly polluted North India was observed.
 - Factors Responsible:
 - Winter in 2022 coincided with the last phase of an unusual triple-dip (or three consecutive years) La Nina event.
 - The change in the normal wind direction
 - During normal time, the wind blows in the north-westerly direction (from Punjab towards and Gangetic plains) which is responsible for stubble burning pollutants to flow in Delhi.
 - However, in the winter of 2022 the wind circulation was in the north-south direction.
 - Air pollutants being carried from Puniab and Haryana bypassed Delhi (lesser pollution) and surrounding areas and flew over western and southern regions.
- La-Nina refers to the periodic cooling of ocean surface temperatures in the central and east-central equatorial Pacific.
 - Typically, occurs every **3 to 5 years** or so.
 - It positively impacts the Indian Monsoon.



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Maharashtra Assembly unanimously passes Bill to provide 10% Reservation to Maratha Community

- Bill seeks to provide reservation to Maratha community in educational institutions and government jobs, based on a comprehensive survey report submitted by Maharashtra State Backward Class Commission.
- Previously in 2021, Supreme Court struck down a similar Act that sought to provide reservation to Maratha Community in educational institutions and State public services, with following observations:
 - No extraordinary circumstances were made out in granting separate reservation to Maratha Community by exceeding the 50% ceiling limit of reservation.
 - 9-judge Bench of the Supreme Court in Indira Sawhney Case (1992) set a ceiling of 50% on reservations under Article 16(4).
 - Article 16(4) enables the State to make provisions in favor of backward classes of citizens in public employment.
 - Exceeding ceiling limit without there being any exceptional circumstances clearly violates Article 14 and 16.
 - Changing 50% limit is to have a society which is not founded on equality but on caste rule.
 - Ocurt also held that criteria for reservation under Article 16(4) should not be proportionate representation but adequate representation.
- Concerns related to the bill: Boost to 'Sons-of-the-soil' movement promoting regionalism, rise of similar demands from other communities affecting social cohesion, etc.

200 years of Rani Chennamma's rebellion against the British East India Company (EIC)

- Commemorating the event, several social groups such as National Federation of Indian Women are organizing national campaign, Naanoo Rani Chennamma (I am Rani Chennamma too) in Kittur.
- About Rani Chennamma (1778-1829)
 - Born in Kakati village in Belagavi district of Karnataka.
 - Became queen of Kitturu (now in Karnataka) when she married Raja Mallasarja of Desai family.
 - Adopted a child, Shivalingappa, after death of her son and made him heir to the throne.
 - British East India Company did not accept this under the Doctrine of Lapse.
 - Values: Courage, Perseverance, Leadership, Selflessness, etc.

Kittur Revolt (1824-29)

- Regarded as the first Indian armed rebellion against British EIC.
- Rani Chennamma defied British order to exile adopted child and sent letter against the order to Lord Elphinstone, the then Lieutenant-Governor of Bombay, which was turned down.
 - It was the first instance of imposition Doctrine of Lapse, even before officially articulated by Lord Dalhousie.
- Though British lost First battle in 1824, Rani Chennamma was later captured and imprisoned at Bailhongal Fort, till her death in 1829.

Doctrine of Lapse

- It was one of the three major annexation policies of British EIC.
 - Other two were Ring Fence Policy and Subsidiary Alliance.
- > Under this, any princely state or territory under the paramountcy of British EIC would automatically be annexed if the ruler was either "manifestly incompetent or died without a male heir".
- Made official by Lord Dalhousie in 1848.

Draft Guidelines on Prevention and Regulation of Greenwashing

- Central Consumer Protection Authority (CCPA) has sought public comments on the proposed guidelines, which shall be issued under Consumer Protection Act, 2019.
- Greenwashing: Means any deceptive or misleading practice, which includes concealing, omitting, or hiding relevant information, by exaggerating, making vague, false, or unsubstantiated environmental claims.
 - Also includes use of misleading words, symbols, or imagery, placing emphasis on positive environmental aspects while downplaying or concealing harmful attributes.
- Key highlights of the Draft Guidelines
 - Applicability: On all advertisements regardless of form, format, or medium.
 - Also applicable on service provider, advertiser, endorser, etc., of the advertisement.
 - **Excludes** advertisement/ communication not specific to any product or service.
 - Prohibition: No person to whom guidelines apply shall engage in Greenwashing.
 - Substantiation of Environmental Claims: Generic terms such as 'clean', 'green', 'eco-friendly', 'ecoconsciousness', 'carbon neutral', etc., shall not be used without adequate qualifiers and substantiation.
 - Adequate Disclosure: All environmental claims in ads or communications shall be fully disclosed.
 - Comparative environmental claims that compare one product/ service to another must be based on verifiable and relevant data that is disclosed to consumers.
 - Disclosures should be easily accessible to consumers and not contradict relevant claims.
 - Aspirational or futuristic environmental claims may be made only when clear and actionable plans has been developed detailing how those objectives will be achieved.

WHO launched Global Initiative on Digital Health (GIDH)

- The initiative was earlier announced at the G20 Health Ministers meeting in India.
- The GIDH will be a WHO Managed Network of stakeholders to address challenges such as duplication of efforts and "products-focused" digital health transformation.
 - GIDH Secretariat will be hosted in **WHO** Headquarters (Geneva).

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> Objective:

- Align efforts to support of the Global Strategy on Digital Health 2020-2025
- Support quality technical assistance to develop and strengthen standards
- Facilitate the use of digital transformation tools
- Foundational Pillars of GIDH
 - Ountry Needs Tracker to facilitate digital health investments
 - Country Resource Portal to identify traditional as well as innovative resource opportunities
 - Transformation Toolbox for quality-assured tools to strengthen country capacity to manage the national digital health transformation.
 - Convening and Knowledge Exchange to promote strengthened collaboration and knowledge exchange

Digital Health initiatives of India


- Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission, launched in 2021
 - It aims to establish a National Digital Health Ecosystem by creating an online platform enabling interoperability of health data within the health ecosystem
 - Through components like Ayushman Bharat Health Account (ABHA) Number, Health Facility Registry, Healthcare Professionals Registry etc.

Indian Renewable Energy Development Agency Limited (IREDA)

- IREDA has indicated plans for establishing a subsidiary to cater to retail projects, e.g. Rooftop Solar, PM-KUSUM, Electric Vehicles, and other Business-to-Consumer (B2C) segments.
- About IREDA
 - Mini Ratna (Category I) Public Limited Government Company established as a Non-Banking Financial Institution in 1987.
 - Under the administrative control of the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy (MNRE).
 - Engaged in promoting, developing and extending financial assistance for setting up projects relating to new and renewable energy sources and energy efficiency/conservation.
 - Motto: "Energy for Ever."
 - Registered and Corporate office: New Delhi



Henley Passport Index (HPI)

- India slipped to 85th position in the recently released Henley Passport Index for 2024.
- About HPI
 - Released by Henley & Partners.
 - Ranks according to number of destinations holders of a passport can access without a prior visa.
 - Based on data from International Air Transport Association (IATA).
 - Compares visa-free access of **199 different passports** to 227 travel destinations.
 - 6 countries France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Singapore, Spain – are ranked 1st in 2024.

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IBSA facility for poverty and hunger alleviation (IBSA Fund)

- India has contributed \$1 Mn to the IBSA Fund.
- About the IBSA Fund
 - It was jointly established by India, Brazil and South Africa in 2004 and became operational in 2006.
 - Fund-supports projects in Global south to achieve their national priorities, as well as all other internationally agreed development goals.
- About IBSA
 - Forum comprises India, Brazil and South Africa.
 - Formalised and named the IBSA Dialogue Forum in 2003.



Shivneri Fort

- Maharashtra Chief Minister paid tribute to Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj on his birth anniversary at Shivneri Fort.
- **About Shivneri Fort**
 - In 1595, King Bahadur Nizam II conferred the fort to Maloji Bhonsale.
 - 17th-century military fortification located in Pune (Maharashtra)
 - Birthplace of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj.
 - One of the 12 component parts of "Maratha Military Landscapes of India" nominations for recognition as UNESCO World Heritage List for 2024-25.
- Other important Maratha forts: Raigad, Rajgad, Lohagad, Sindhudurg, Torna, Devgad, etc.

X-Ray Binary Stars

- An international team of scientists studied a transient X-ray binary system named MAXI J1820+070, using AstroSat's full multi-wavelength capabilities.
- **About X-ray Binary Stars**
 - Special class of binary stars which emit X-rays.
 - Binary star systems contain two stars that orbit around ٠ their common centre of mass.
 - Made up of a normal star and a collapsed star (a white dwarf, neutron star, or black hole).
- AstroSat is first dedicated Indian astronomy mission to study celestial sources in X-ray, optical and UV spectral bands simultaneously.



Blended Finance

State Government of Goa and Power Finance Corporation signed an MoU to support state's climate ambitions through subnational Blended Finance Facility (BFF).

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- BFF will be utilized to fund key climate projects such as green hydrogen, waste-to-wealth technology, nature-based solutions. etc.
- **Blended finance** is the strategic use of development finance for mobilisation of additional finance towards sustainable development.
 - ➔ It uses concessional finance (i.e. a subsidy) to reduce perceived risk of an investment.
 - Seen as a tool to leverage additional private investment.



Human - Animal conflict

- Kerala has allocated Rs.13 Crore to address the issue of mananimal conflict in the Wayanad District
- **Man-Animal Conflict in India**
 - Earlier the Ministry of Environment had released 14 specific guidelines for mitigating the conflict.
 - The conflict is normally dealt through coordinated interdepartmental action, identification of conflict hot spots, establishment of rapid response teams etc.
 - An ex-gratia payment in case of Human-Wildlife conflict is offered to the tune of Rs. 10 Lakhs in case of deaths and Rs. 2 Lakhs in case of grievous injury.

- **Green Anaconda**
- Researchers found that green anacondas are actually two D genetically distinct species.
- About Green Anaconda(Eunectes murinus)
 - A member of the boa family(Nonvenomous snake)
 - It is the heaviest snake in the world, weighing more than 550 pounds.
 - Females are significantly larger than males.
 - IUCN status: Least Concern
 - Habitat: live in swamps, marshes, and slow-moving streams, mainly in the tropical rain forests of the Amazon and Orinoco basins.
 - Lifespan: in the wild is about 10 years.
